A WORD FROM SENIOR PASTOR JON RHODES

How does God's love abide in anyone who has the world's goods and sees a brother or sister in need and yet refuses help? Little children, let us love, not in word or speech, but in truth and action. ~1 John 3:17-18

People of Christiania,

On Maundy Thursday we heard Jesus giving a new command: **"I give you a new** commandment, that you love one another. Just as I have loved you, you also should love one another" (John 13:34). Like Christ loves, we are to love. You may remember Maundy Thursday means, *new commandment*. Likewise, in sharing the most important commandment, Jesus provides two: love God and love neighbor.

Holy Scripture encourages, even commands, movement toward love being an action toward others in the world. Following Christ's teachings can move us from lives focused inwardly on self to lives focused outwardly on others; in this God is pleased. **Do not neglect to do good and to share what you have, for such sacrifices are pleasing to God** (Hebrews 13:16 NIV).

For Maundy Thursday worshipers, you may have noticed we had a visitor: Ginger. A newcomer to our worship community, Ginger was clearly out of place and even in discomfort in some ways. Our visitor had showed up at Christiania a few hours before worship and, thankfully, our Director of Faith Formation, Joe Jorgensen, was here to receive her.

In conversation with Joe, Ginger shared she was trying to get home to Wells, Maine by bus. She had come after hearing of her father's death. Joe engaged her in conversation and helped her find a more direct route home by bus online. The first opportunity to begin her bus ride home left from Faribault in two days.

After arriving at Christiania a little while later, I also had a chance to get to know Ginger and hear her story. Evidently, she grew up in Lakeville but called Maine her home for the past decade. She arrived at Christiania by accident; the cemetery where her father was buried was called, Christdala. An internet search later revealed this cemetery was affiliated with the Christdala Evangelical Church and was Swedish in origin. Ginger had mistakenly arrived at Christiania. An honest mistake or part of God's plan? Perhaps both?

After hearing her story and praying with her, I told Ginger we could help with money toward a bus ticket. She was so thankful. The funds had been provided weeks earlier by one of our thoughtful, generous families. After thanking me, Ginger started walking back—to Northfield. At this point I learned she had walked from her hotel in Northfield to Christiania and was planning to walk the ten-mile journey back to Northfield. With 7 pm worship quickly approaching, it occurred to me she would be walking in the dark. This seemed wrong.

"Why don't you stay for worship," I invited, "Let's see if we can find you a ride back." She headed toward the dark fellowship area, but I welcomed her to join us in the brightly lit sanctuary. She planted herself in the back corner of the side chapel. Ginger looked uncomfortable as she fidgeted with her hoodie pulled up over her head.

During worship I noticed she stopped fidgeting, then she pulled down her hoodie and seemed to become more comfortable. I was delighted to see by the end of worship she was engaged in conversation with several Christiania members who had moved toward her to introduce themselves, hear her story, and help. One family provided some financial help for food and lodging. One Christiania member provided a ride to Faribault.

On Maundy Thursday God had provided a modern-day example about Jesus' radical and intimate way of loving. This kind of love is dangerous and risky. The one who had given Ginger a ride to Faribault had a chance to model Christ's love. They talked about life, got to know one another, and put her up at a Faribault hotel for the evening. Our good Samaritan was so moved by the Spirit that she prayed with Ginger, blessed her, and gifted her with a cross necklace she was wearing. The Spirit was, indeed, present.

Ginger's visit has continued to draw us in to intentional, mutual relationship. In the days following her visit, we learned Ginger's presence in worship felt dangerous and scary to some among us. We also learned there were other ways of helping. One of our people became aware of Maundy Thursday's engagement and purchased some Uber Gift Cards to leave at church for a future need.

Isn't it interesting: Ginger's visit was both an energizing opportunity to love a stranger and a dangerous interaction with a stranger?

Holy Scripture has much to say about loving and helping those in need. God Blesses those who assist: *It is a sin to despise one's neighbor, but blessed is the one who is kind to the needy* (Proverbs 14:21 *NIV*). *Valuing and loving others is putting their interests ahead of your own: Do nothing out of selfish ambition or vain conceit. Rather, in humility value others above yourselves, not looking to your own interests but each of you to the interests of the others (Philippians 2:3-4 <i>NIV*). When we love others, we are loving God: for *I was hungry and you gave me food, I was thirsty and you gave me clothing, I was sick and you took care of me, I was in prison and you visited me.' Then the righteous will answer him, 'Lord, when was it that we saw you hungry and gave you food, or thirsty and gave you something to drink? And when was it that we saw you a stranger and welcomed you, or naked and gave you clothing? And when was it that we saw you sick or in prison and visited you?' And the king will answer them, 'Truly I tell you, just as you did it to one of the least of these who are members of my family, you did it to me' (Matthew 25:35-40).*

This kind of love is challenging. This kind of love is intimate. This kind of love is dangerous. Thanks be to God!

God loves you and so do I!

Joe Jorgensen, Director of Faith Formation is also on the agenda. Finally, the American Red Cross will have a blood drive on Wednesday, May 26 from 2:00 p.m.-8:00 p.m. Sign up early, the spots fill up fast!

The church season of Easter coincides with a new growing season. Each of them helps us renew our optimism--one for our faith and one for the hope for an abundant crop. As spring and summer arrives, take time to recharge for the year ahead and look for the little things that brighten your day.

AN UPDATE FROM THE COVID RESPONSE TEAM

Since March of 2020, the COVID Response Team — a group of medical professionals, educators, staff, and volunteers — has been working to develop and update COVID-related policies for the Christiania community. The basis for these policy recommendations comes from CDC, MN Department of Health, and local medical and school district guidelines. This team continues to meet bi-weekly to discuss and review any changes in those guidelines, to update church policy recommendations, and to evaluate how those policies impact specific upcoming events.

Currently, despite high vaccination rates of the 16+ population (42.2% with at least 1 dose), COVID confirmed cases and deaths continue to rise. This week's positivity rate was above the state's target rate of 5% at 6.7%, with Scott (8.1%) and Dakota (7.9%) counties exceeding even the state rate; ICU utilization is at about 77% but with a dangerous level of new cases that include a large number of youth and middle aged populations. Because of these current trends, the most recent version of the "Stay Safe MN COVID Requirements for Faith-based Communities, Places of Worship, Weddings and Funerals" (dated 4/15/2021) reflects no change in guidelines. (<u>https://www.health.state.mn.us/diseases/</u> coronavirus/safefaith.pdf)

While we are desperately longing to return to the congregational life to which we had grown accustomed, (at the time of this writing) the team is not currently making any new recommendations or revisions to existing policies. The team will continue to meet regularly as we develop a plan to safely return to beloved Christiania activities such as coffee social, CYF engagement, normalized indoor events, serving meals, traditional communion, and more singing.

In the meantime, we will continue to engage in practices recommended by the CDC and the Stay Safe MN guidelines. These practices include staying home when experiencing symptoms, wearing face coverings, maintaining social distancing, forgoing indoor food/beverages, and engaging in good hygiene practices such as hand washing/sanitizing and regular cleaning/ disinfecting of our facility. These actions remain critical to our ability to protect our congregation, staff and community. Our number one goal is to safely remain open to continue our ministries. Thank you for your help and patience during this difficult period.
